This event was created at the initiative of ITD RO, in order to further develop, locally, an educational programme for children from the Roma community in Tinca — a programme which will use the educational (and employment) material of PAL project, offered by SRDA; the best example is the fable of ‘The Elephant and the Giraffe’.

AIM

The aim is to teach the Roma children about their rights, from an early age-- *“because children who know their rights are better able to claim them.”* ITD RO

OBJECTIVE

The final objective is to help integrate the Roma children-- from an early age to youth-- into the school system, and later on, in the employment market, and today’s society.

SUMMARY of Event

‘My Right to be Happy’ – participation: abt 25 children

The children will learn

- about the ‘Convention on the Rights of the Child’, thus, their rights
- that together with rights come, also, responsibilities
- that even if they have rights, they need to respect their parents

At the end of the event there will be an exercise:

- Every child will be invited to make a drawing with ‘one right’ that he learned.
